OSL Privacy Policy Effective October 2007

At its spring 2007 meeting in Franklin Park, IL, members of the OSL Council discussed the need for a privacy policy regarding personal information that is part of the membership records. Beginning in October of this year, when you receive your paperwork for reaffirmation and/or updating of directory information, you will have the opportunity to let the Chancellor-General know which information you want to be shared—in the OSL directory available online in the "members only" section of the OSL website—and which you want hidden from public view. These changes will become effective when Brother Chancellor-General Brent Sturm and Sister Lisa Griffith enter the information from this year's forms in the directory.

Why do we need a privacy policy?

Some members are concerned about the security of information stored online, even when it is password-protected.

Who has access to the online directory?

OSL members who have received the password from Brother Brent, and who go to the "members only" section of the OSL website at <u>www.saint-luke.org</u>.

Who will have access to information I ask to be "hidden?"

The Chancellor-General will keep this information in the OSL database, and use it in the necessary communication with members that is the responsibility of this office. It will be released only to the other elected general officers (Abbot, Prior-General, Provincial-General) when they request it to carry out the duties of their offices.

Presentation Speech for the 2007 Roger Deschner Award Given by Elvin Nicely at the 2007 FUMMWA Convocation in St. Louis, MO on July 19, 2007

It seems that every pursuit has it experts. For manners we have Judith Martin, for home repair there's Bob Vila, for the best of taste in home décor we turn to Martha Stewart, for all things technical we have Bill Nye the Science Guy and for yum-o foods there's Rachel Ray. In fact for just about every topic you or I could name, we would surely be able to name an expert in that field. And so it is with the person who has been chosen as the recipient of the 2007 Roger Deschner Award - a person who is easily identified as an expert. The award committee, including Donna Gerber, Doug Grove-DeJarnett, Brad Kisner and Sam Marley, was charged with the responsibility of considering nominees from our National Council and from our general membership. Specifically we were to identify a person who had spent a lifetime involved in service to the church in the areas of worship, liturgy and the arts; a person who is nationally recognized and visible throughout the church via publications, workshops and seminars; and finally a person who is approaching retirement age or already retired from active service; in other words, an expert.

We are pleased to announce that we have identified someone who not only meets the stated requirements but actually gives new meaning to them. The recipient of this year's award served the local church for thirty years before coming to work for the General Board of Discipleship in 1993. Since that time he has authored and co-authored full length books, led seminars and workshops, studied and designed outstanding worship experiences and written countless articles to help those of us in the trenches as we lead our congregations into the presence of God. In addition he played major roles in the creation of "This Holy Mystery" and "By Water and the Spirit," the official United Methodist documents on Holy Communion and baptism. A quick trip to the search engine for the GBOD web site reveals over 1,060 hits when you type in his name.

After growing up in central New York state and receiving BA and Master of Divinity degrees from Syracuse University and the American Baptist Seminary of the West, our recipient served the local church in the California-Pacific Annual Conference. He has led countless retreats and workshops for pastors and church worship leaders across the United States, and for many of us he had been a constant and abiding source of information concerning music and liturgy. This is a man who is married with two grown children and grandchildren; a man who enjoys gardening, walking, cooking, surfing the internet, and spending time with his wife, Mary O, in their Hawaiian retirement home; and a man who so personifies the spirit and essence of the Deschner Award that even his last name is a blessing. The 2008 Convocation/Retreat of the Order of Saint Luke (October 13-16, 2008) will feature a series of three workshops led by Br Taylor Burton-Edwards, Director of Worship Resources with the General Board of Discipleship (UMC).

The title of the workshop series is "SLICE: Vital Worship in the Wesleyan Tradition... and Your Tradition, too!."

SLICE stands for "Sacramental. Liturgical, Indigenous, Connected, Embodied."

These workshops will help pastors and lay-clergy teams from congregations claim the strengths of their current patterns of worship in each of these five areas and build on those strengths help their worship become more vital and have deeper integrity with both their own congregation and across the larger ecumenical Christian tradition.

You and your congregation will benefit most if you come in teams of three or more-- perhaps the pastor, a musician or artist, and a trusted lay leader. Such teams will have time to think, discuss and pray together and go home with a working plan for next steps that will already have some commitment from other leaders in the church.

Whether you come as a team or solo, lay or clergy, all may benefit from learning and sharing how this kind of strengths-based model may help any congregation find who is ready and what is ready to move your expressions of worship to the next level.

EDITOR'S NOTE: It's not too early to put the 2008 Retreat/Convocation on your calendar – and to invite people from your congregation to attend with you! Hold the dates of **October 13-16** and plan to be there for worship, fellowship, and some exciting conversation as Br. Taylor Burton-Edwards shares a SLICE of his work with us

From the Chancellor-General

My Dear Siblings,

As you know, membership in The Order of Saint Luke requires that one reaffirm the Rule of Life and Service in writing to the Chancellor General at least annually. To that end, Abbot Mark and I send you the appropriate form annually (around August 1st). If you have taken Life Vows, you will receive a form to update your contact information, as annual reaffirmation is not required of life-vowed members. All forms should be returned to my office by October 18th, the feast of our patron.

For the first time this year, you will be able to provide contact information to The Order that will not appear in the Membership Directory available on the web site, if you so indicate on the form. So, if there are e-mail addresses and phone numbers that you are willing for the General Officers to have, but would prefer not to have published, you will be able to so indicate. Also, you will be able to request that no listing for you appear in the directory at all.

If you affirmed the Rule in calendar year 2006, you should now receive *The Font* (either in print or electronic form), *Sacramental Life*, and the annual issue of *Doxology*. Those who did not affirm in 2006, but did affirm in 2005, are not now receiving publications, but will receive a request for re-affirmation. (These are the folks who are listed as being on "Leave of Absence".) Those who have not affirmed since 2004 will not receive any notification from my office. They are the ones whom you need to contact and invite back into our family.

Please remember that the payment of "dues" or other financial support of The Order, while greatly appreciated and necessary for our financial survival, are not the basis of membership. Even if you can't afford to send a financial gift, please return the form - you'll remain fully a member of The Order in good standing. If you're able to send more than the "Basic" level of financial support, you'll be helping your Order and those who are unable to give. I've been on both sides of that equation, so I can tell you that my additional gift now is in thanksgiving for those who gave so much when I was able to give so little. The

Order of Saint Luke is, first and foremost in my mind, a family: we bear one another's burdens - both in prayer and financially.

Watch the web site for the minutes of the May meeting of the Council of the General Chapter. It was a great time in Chicagoland, and each of us who bear responsibility for the governance of your Order felt both the blessing of the Spirit and the weight of our task as we gathered for business, celebration and worship. Those of you who have read them know that the minutes of our meetings are detailed and long - but the Spirit moves through our business just as through our community and work.

In the Baubles and Beads department, there are changes afoot! The vestment patches that we've used for years are nearly out of print. When the current stock is gone, they are gone forever. The patches on white (for albs) and black (for academic robes and tippits) are gone, they're gone! A new patch, with the logo in full color, will be available in the fall. Also, the celtic cross in sterling silver is now permanently out of stock, although it is still available in pewter. With the rising costs of previous metals, the artist who casts these crosses is no longer able to offer us sterling silver at any price. (I don't pretend to understand this, but the mold and process used for sterling is different than that used for pewter. Our mold for pewter is in good shape, but the one used for sterling is beyond repair.) That cross will soon be available in silver plate. As I write this, we await receipt of the first castings using this new process. Give us a call, or watch the web site, for price and availability.

The cloisonné lapel pin that we've offered for some time is now available as a tie tack and as cuff links. Check the web site, or give us a call for pricing and availability. New items that are in the research stage include a new shirt with the "winged ox" from the Book of Kells in full color, and a coffee mug with the Order's logo. Again, watch the web site for announcements about availability. I've had several requests about an OSL ring. That, too, is in the research stage. I expect to have new shirts and coffee mugs within a year, but the rings will take more time.

Finally, know that I also serve a local church in addition to my work as your Chancellor General. At Emmanuel United Methodist Church in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, we are in the midst of the construction of the Neil Campbell Parker Center for Community Ministries. That \$1.4 million project will provide a primary care medical clinic for the poor, better facilities for the White Sulphur Springs Community Food Pantry, and a new administrative office suite (YEA!) for the staff, among many other changes. It will also enable us to better serve all of you. During the construction, however, life here is a bit difficult. A staff of seven is sharing a single office, and phone and internet service (along with other utilities) are sporadic at best. Please be patient with us in the coming months. When this is done, life will be great - in the mean time, patience is the rule of the day. If you call (304/536-1291) and get the voice mail, please leave a message. If your e-mail (chancellor@saint-luke.org) doesn't get a response within 2 or 3 business days, please resend it. Sister Lisa and I are doing our best, but that isn't always good enough. As with the eschaton, life is gonna be really great on the other side! Now, if we can just get there!

I pray every day for all of my sisters and brothers. I pray for you by name when your affirmation form, a contact update, or an order, crosses my desk. I know that you pray for me. That's what enables me to face the challenges of ministry each morning! May God bless each and every one of you for your ministry to the world, and for your prayers.

One of the challenging aspects of the Provincial General's job is trying to get news from chapters that have become inactive. Chapters may become inactive as the geographic distances that come with pastoral moves make it difficult to meet. Or, in the case of seminaries, with graduations and changing student interests, chapters may wax and wane. We have discovered that for a chapter to remain active takes the dedication and hard work, the passion, of one or more members.

This introduction is intended as a gentle way to announce that several inactive chapters are notably inactive, and have been acknowledged as discontinued (officially, dissolved). These inactive chapters are: Little Rock, Barnabas (Maine), West Michigan, Iowa, Erie, Troy, and Wisconsin.

If these chapters are viable, the Council of the General Chapter would be happy to reconsider this action. In fact, according to our By-Laws, should changing circumstances dictate, a chapter may petition for a review of the Council decision for dissolution, may petition to be re-chartered, or petition to be reconstituted as an association. If you are (or have been) a part of these discontinued chapters, and wish to comment or express your concern about this decision, please feel free to communicate with me. Furthermore, if your dissolved chapter has any remaining financial assets, our By-Laws state that they are to be remitted promptly to the General Chapter through our Chancellor General. [See By-Laws, section 5i.]

I am pleased to announce to you the formation of new groups within the Order. The **Puerto Rico Chapter** has been forming under the leadership of Sr. Sheni Martinez-Correa, Prior. They have been very actively developing their chapter and studying the sacramental life. A second group, the **Middle Tennessee Association**, is under new leadership with Br. Gary Smith serving as Convener. Both groups were chartered on May 22, 2007 at the Council meeting in Chicago. In addition, efforts are underway to form a chapter in **North Texas**, and the **Wesley-Allen Chapter** in the Detroit, Michigan area is reorganizing.

With the "appointment season" comes several pastoral changes (including my own). These moves usually mean that contact information is changed. If you are the primary contact person for your chapter or association, when you move <u>or change your internet service provider</u>, please remember to update your contact information with me.

Chapter activity reports are published in *The Font* on a rotation basis, culled from chapter reports that were shared at the most recent Council meeting (spring or fall). Due to my move, the July/August issue of *The Font* did not have a report. With this issue, the reports continue. This process helps your national officers know what effect the Order is having on a regional basis, and your group may be inspired to try a new activity. To provide the latest information (or corrections) about your chapter's events, you are welcome to submit an article to *The Font*.

Chapter News

The **Cyber Chapter** "meets" 24/7/363 (except in Leap Years – 364, because we keep silence from Maundy Thursday night until after the Great Vigil). This spring, topics included the Virginia Tech tragedy and responses, Anglican liturgical practices, Sunday School and other means of spiritual formation, welcoming new participants. Br. Taylor Burton-Edwards continues to serve as Prior.

Br. Lloyd Speer, Prior reports that the **Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter** meets six times a year. Each regular meeting has two parts (1) a Service of Word and Table, and (2) Discussion about a topic related to the work and mission of the Order. In June 2007, we sponsored a workshop at annual conference in

which Carolyn Tanner will use material from her new OSL publication, *This Holy Mystery: A Study Guide For Children and Youth*, to present methodologies for teaching *THM* to children and youth. As a follow up to this, we will invite people to read Mark Stamm's new book *Let Every Soul Be Jesus' Guest* over the summer and join us to discuss its contents at our September chapter meeting.

The **Holy Cross Chapter** of the Kansas Area meets annually at the Kansas West Annual Conference "and visit as best we can throughout the year." The last formal exchange in person was last May (2006) at Salina during the Kansas West Conference. Br. Kenton Van continues to serve as Prior; Br. Richard Zimmerman is the Chancellor.

In a report filed last October (2006), the **Memphis Conference Chapter** generally meets quarterly, but have not met recently; June moves caused quite the stir. They are looking at combining with the Memphis-MTS chapter to have a "critical mass" and viable meeting.

The **New York Annual Conference Chapter** meets annually during Annual Conference and at regional meetings throughout the year. The Chapter still provides copies of *By Water and the Spirit* and *This Holy Mystery* to ministerial candidates. Our discussions this year will be on the various forms of the Daily Office and the movement toward weekly communion in the parishes.

Our Abbot, Br. Mark Stamm, reported for the **Perkins School of Theology Chapter**: We have sponsored a weekly worship service (sometimes Morning Prayer; sometimes Word and Table). We did not have a separate Easter Vigil this year, but rather, moved across the parking lot to Highland Park UMC and combined with the Cox Chapel congregation on their Vigil. By the way, a Great Thanksgiving from *Lift Up Your Hearts* is used weekly at Cox Chapel. The chapter sponsored a healing service which was held as part of the midday Perkins Chapel program.

The **Saura-Piedmont Chapter** meets on the second Wednesday of the month. Primary activities include fellowship and discussion while eating lunch. We have had good discussions of topics relating to activities in local congregations, and within the Order as a whole.

A year ago, Br. Brent Strum reported that the **West Virginia Chapter** meets six times a year and hosts an annual retreat with the WV Conference Order of Elders. This year's retreat was on *This Holy Mystery* and featured presentations by W. Brent Sturm, Bishop William Boyd Grove, and Prior Jim Reed. The chapter is currently completing work on a book of worship resources, which we hope to publish this summer.

Next, a drive down to Bristol, Rhode Island where we visited an elegant old mansion and gardens, where another Hummingbird came hovering six inches from my waist, checking whether the colorful little fabric dangle on the zipper of my fanny pack was a nectar-bearing flower. (I wanted to take its picture but didn't dare move. So you'll just have to trust that I'm not making this up!) Finally, we enjoyed a fabulous dinner on the terrace of a restaurant that fronts on Narragansett Bay. The tide came in, bringing the sound of waves lapping just 10 feet or so below us. Br. Brent Sturm reports that the \$1.4 million building project at his church is now underway. This will house a Center for Community Ministries (gym, food pantry warehouse and service area, commercial kitchen, primary care medical clinic, fenced playground, youth and child mentoring and high school dropout prevention program, Montessori pre-school, administrative offices, and more. The Center will be named in memory of Neil Campbell Parker, Br. Brent's dear friend and Lay Leader of his church, who died after an auto accident four years ago.
