From the Abbot's Desk

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I hope this letter finds you well.

I attended Annual Conference this past week in my newly adopted conference, the North Texas Conference. At the end, we engaged in that old Methodist

Annual Conference ritual, the reading of the appointments. Bishop Alfred Norris read the names of several hundred places (including Paradise and Paris) and persons (including Stamm and some other OSL siblings), each of whom stood in turn, in a process that took about an hour to complete. The venerable appointment reading ritual always gets me thinking about vocation and the places where I do it.

As to Perkins School of Theology, when I begin my ninth year of work there on July 1st, I will have lived and served here longer than any other place. As many of you know, I've been an itinerant in several realms—as a Methodist preacher's kid while growing up, in my own work as a pastor of churches in Kentucky and Pennsylvania, and in academia. Thus I am living in my twelfth home, in my fourth state. As I've worked with my spiritual director over the past two years, I've come to realize that I grieve for each of the first eleven places I've lived. And, it doesn't stop with physical places. A wise academic mentor once told me that, for him, graduation day is both time of celebration and time of mourning. After eight years of watching beloved students graduate, I think I understand what he meant.

I moved for the first time when I was nine months old, leaving the parsonage in Orbisonia, Pennsylvania for one in Duncansville, Pennsylvania. According to my mother, a similar light fixture hung in the kitchen of each house. As she tells the story, I looked up at the light in the new place, saw something familiar, but then noticed that everything else was different. According to her, I threw back my head and howled. Perhaps she was projecting her own grief on me—I presume she had her own--but remember that mothers are often adept at interpreting their baby's cries. For me, this memory, in some ways deeper than memory, is iconic.

As I said, I grieve for my first eleven homes, although I don't want you to think that I'm constantly sitting in a puddle of tears. Usually, it's not a debilitating grief, just an occasional awareness of places and people left behind. Acknowledging it as grief is actually liberating. Like much grief, mine is a function of loving deeply and then facing a change that cannot be reversed. The dynamic, I'm convinced, is deeply biblical. I read it in Hebrews: "By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going" (Heb. 11: 8). Like him and others named in that chapter, our destination is a heavenly country (Heb. 11: 16) an eschatological (eucharistic!) place, if you will. And so, we commit to the Body of Christ in each place, while knowing that change (and thus, grief) is inevitable. Such is part of the Paschal dynamic.

Many of you, and not just the ordained folks, are moving through fresh transitions, vocational and otherwise. And most of us will face more transitions. My home and my work are here, at Perkins/SMU, in Texas, even in this Annual Conference, and I embrace them, both in joy and as a spiritual discipline. Will I always live and work here? I don't know, but I will do my best to remain obedient to God, to a journey of faith in the spirit of Abraham.

Wherever God places you, may you know your deepest home in the sacramental life, that foretaste of the heavenly country.

Chapter News

The **California-Pacific Chapter** meets approximately six times per year. We were pleased to be the host General Chapter for the 2007 Retreat. This January, the chapter held its Annual Retreat in Redlands, California. Meetings were calendared for 2008; brainstorming resulted in five topics/programs for implementation. Our 2009 Annual Retreat will be January 20-21, 2009. New officers were elected at the retreat: Br. Bob Davis, Prior; Br. Bob Nixon, Sub Prior for lay vocation (recruitment); Br. George Crisp, Sub-Prior for the life of OSL in Hawaii; Br. Bill Kintner, Chancellor; Br. Lee Cunningham, Chaplain. A sub-prior to reach out to others, particularly clergy, and if necessary, to act as a "VP" has yet to be determined. On March 26, nine members of the chapter met with six students and one faculty member on the campus of Claremont School of Theology. It was a fine event that exceeded expectations. Dear Brothers and Sisters, Greetings to you in the name of Jesus Christ.

I know that it seems as if October is a long way off, but we cannot begin too soon to look forward to our gathering for Convocation and Retreat at St. Paul of the Cross Retreat Center in Pittsburgh (Monday, October 13th through Thursday, October 16th.)

Many of you have not heard the story of the *last* time the Order met in Retreat in Pittsburgh. For reasons passing understanding, (other than the letter "P" and a condition I can only characterize as travel-related dyslexia) I booked and boarded a flight to Philadelphia instead. Once I realized my mistake, I managed to correct it in time to gather with my brothers and sisters to praise God, to learn more about praying the Psalms, and to receive that gift of comfort and strength which always comes to me at the annual Retreat of our Order.

Let me also give you an update on our Holy Hardware Acquisition Project. Sisters and Brothers:

"Comfort." That and related words appear almost ninety times in the English Bible, together with a like number of references to healing, plus assorted other words like "balm." When I think of this, my mind always travels first to the opening of Isaiah, chapter 40. "Comfort! Comfort my people,' says your God" – usually sounding through my soul set to the music of Handel's oratorio, *The Messiah*.

I thought of this again recently when Amy and I went to hear a performance of Brahms' *Ein Deutches Requiem*, that opens and closes with the choruses centered on the words *Selig sind* – "Blessed are those who mourn ... " and "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord ... " Two things in particular struck me. First was the lump in my throat forcing tears to my eyes as the music began. *Selig sind* ... for they shall be comforted." The other, after the last notes fell into silence, was the, oh, so very long silence before a packed cathedral exploded into thunderous applause.

In composing his *Requiem*, Brahms abandoned the traditional text from the Latin Requiem Mass with its great *Dies Irae*, which portrays the Day of Judgment and concentrates on prayer for the souls of those who have died. Instead, he hand picked passages from his German Bible to bring <u>comfort</u> to the living. Writing in 1866, he may have composed the *Requiem* in memory of his mother, who had died, or perhaps his friend and teacher Robert Schumann, who had died after a tragic onset of mental illness. Either way, it's clear that the biblical passages he chose spoke to him of the comfort he sought in his own grief.

Brahms' intention, the lump in my own throat, the silence-before-applause of the audience at this performance all speak to me of the deep longing we all share for <u>comfort</u>. Some of us, depending on circumstances, are bearing quite a heavy load, but all of us live in the midst of the tragedies of our world.

<u>Nevertheless</u> (another biblical word I like very much), there is still blessing. There is still comfort. And I continue to wonder at the awesome ways God speaks through us to each other in the Order. To mention only a few examples: We validate one another's concerns. (No, we're not weird to want to magnify the sacraments and celebrate them with integrity.) We pray for one another. (Yes, Brother. Yes, Sister. I hear you. I care. And I lift you and your loved ones into the light of God's healing grace right now.) We pick up the phone so we can hear each other's voices across the miles of our dispersion. Many of us share thought and prayer via the Cyber Chapter. When we are fortunate to gather as at Chapter or General Chapter meetings and retreats, we know the comfort of <u>both seeing and being seen</u> through the eyes of faith. Most of all, whatever we may be experiencing at any given time and place when we come to the Lord's

Table we may sense one another's presence there across the miles. To me, these are all very comforting gifts of grace.

And then there is the sharing of stories of our joys and sorrows. Some of that news follows. Community after community began to flood in eastern Iowa, then spreading to the west. In Cedar Rapids' Salem UMC, the church where Br. Steve's wife *Linda* is the senior pastor, the water has reached about half way up the outside walls. They had sandbagged, but in vain. Several other churches have been lost. The Cedar River, the Iowa River, etc., a total of nine rivers in Iowa are at higher water levels than ever in history. In summary, Br. Steve writes, "What is hitting national news is a mere hint of the full picture," and he thanks us all for our prayers. The town of Dike, IA, where Br. A Quick Look at Demographics

Membership in The Order stands at 745. Of these, 591 are under annual vows, 59 under life vows, and 95 are on leave of absence. Our membership is about one-third female (236 members), 87% United Methodist (647 members), and 75% clergy (556 members).

112 persons were removed from membership effective December 31, 2007, having not affirmed The Rule since at least December 31, 2005. Some of those, however, have since affirmed. 169 persons were placed on Leave of Absence effective December 31, 2007, having not affirmed The Rule in 2007. Through the work of our Provincial General and the Provincial Companions, 74 of those persons (44%) have returned to active membership. Efforts to nurture the remaining 95 members on leave are ongoing.

Members under Annual Vows must reaffirm The Rule at least annually, in writing, to the Chancellor General. A form is provided each fall for this purpose, and folk are asked to submit that form by October 18th each year. (The form can be also found at the Order of Saint Luke web site by going to <u>http://www.saint-luke.org</u> and clicking on "Who We Are" and then on "Joining OSL". A button for a pdf version of the form will be found at the bottom of this page.) Those who have not re-affirmed by Thanksgiving receive a follow-up letter. They are then placed on Leave of Absence effective January 1st and referrals are made to the Provincial Companions through the office of The Provincial General.

Members of The Order who have been under Annual Vows for at least three full years may make application to the Abbot to enter discernment toward the profession of Life Vows. This is a personal decision and many - indeed, most - members choose to remain under Annual Vows.

Actions Taken at the May Council Meeting

At the meeting of the Council on the General Chapter in Charlotte on May 19, the decision was made to increase the suggested giving levels for members. The new amounts, effective this fall, are:
