From the Abbot's Desk

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I am grateful for your confidence in me and the God who upholds us in our life together. Collectively you have chosen me to serve as your abbot. We are a strange bird among communities living by a rule: inclusive, dispersed, eclectic, and apostolic. Like asking what kind of God would create a giraffe,

many will ask what kind of proper God would have anything to do with the Order of Saint Luke. Those of us who are living our way into and out of the Rule of Life and Service are discovering the unique spirituality that goes with this Lukan community. If we are idiosyncratic in conception and practice it is because we are a pilgrim people evolving from a society in 1946 to a community ordered by a unique sense of vocation and discipline that pulls us together in companionship and love. In short, as your abbot, I can tell you that I see us as a beloved community. That will be, I sense now (six days as abbot), central to my work of loving and leading among you.

At the same time, I come to the abbatial office in a very specific context. As I met with the General Chapter of the Order last Wednesday fresh from the service of investiture, I shared the following joys and questions:

"We rejoice in our life together and living out our charism as an Order: We continue our life together and live out our charism of proclaiming the Apostolic Hope, magnifying the sacraments, seeking the sacramental life and heeding the call to service in the church and the world.

- Sr. Heather Josselyn Cranson, new mother, musician, scholar and teacher, has accepted a call to serve on the committee for the revision of the new United Methodist hymnal.
- Br. Taylor Burton Edwards continues to serve as director of worship resources at the General Board of Discipleship of The United Methodist Church.
- Br. Mark Stamm, Sr. Karen Westerfield Tucker, Br. E. Byron (Ron) Anderson, Sr. Susan Smith, and others continue to teach liturgy and sacramental spirituality at Perkins, Boston University, Garrett-Evangelical and St. Paul School of Theology. There are others I am may have missed (please correct the list).
- And you—you and all of the brothers and sisters in the Order—continue to love God in the liturgy, both in "full, active and conscious" participation and in planning and leading through music, preaching, presiding and assisting, and enacting the grace of God in bath, story, and meal. Some of our Order accept the call to service in their districts, annual conferences or dioceses as Worship Directors or service on worship committees helping local church leaders grow in knowledge and skills around liturgy and sacramental spirituality.
- In chapters, associations, and general retreat settings, we continue "to devote ourselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers...with glad and generous hearts." (Acts 2:42, 47 adapted)

• In the round of the daily office of the church we pray for one another, especially those who face life crises and life opportunities.

Certainly each of you would add specific joys to this list.

"And we face opportunities and challenges: We are living in a time of deep societal, cultural, environmental and economic change. How shall we, the Order of Saint Luke, live out our charism as an Order and out of our Rule of Life and Service? Here I raise some fairly pointed questions, and invite your responses:

- What do you seek from the Order and our life together?
- What is most needed in strengthening our communal life in our chapters? With those as yet not in chapters? Our *diaspora* in national and international apostolicity?
- What do you seek from your abbot?
- What do you sense to be the prompting of the Spirit in forming inquirers and new members in the life of the community and in our RLS? What do you recall from your own formation that was significant and worthy of enacting for the sake of inquirers and new members?
- As stewards of God's manifold grace, are you willing to take real, meaningful and communal steps to reduce the Order's carbon footprint? What specific changes in practice in family, church and Order should we embrace? (This question grows out of a real conviction in my own life and one that intensifies as I think about flying from distant Hawaii to participate in the life and work of the Order.)
- In a time when economics are pinching ever more tightly, how shall we go about conducting our spring council meeting? [The Council adopted a revised plan which will be shared in a future issue of the Font.]
- What is your sense of the Order's place in your finances? Are you willing and able to make a regular donation to the work of the Order?
- What shall our publishing ministry be? Do we see it as a continuing and important aspect of our charism as an Order?
- How will we seek to reflect more fully the inclusiveness of Christ's church in the membership of the Order? Will we (you) reach out to younger generations, racial/ethnic persons—in short all who may be yearning for such a community?"

Pray for me along with Sr. Sue Moore, and Brs. Brent Sturm and George Crisp as we seek to discern the Cloud and Fire that goes ahead of us. Love and pray for each other and "be there" for each other to the glory of God and the building up of the community.

As many of you know, we have entered into a contract with Discipleship Resources (DR) to provide marketing and order fulfillment services for our publications. They will stock our books, take and mail orders, and handle payments. Our books will appear in their catalogs and on their website. At the 2008 General Chapter meeting, held during our annual retreat in Pittsburgh, we recognized three newly formed chapters and presented their representatives with Chartering Certificates. We welcome the following chapters to our family:

The Northern New England Chapter will meet five times a year, and have begun with a discussion of the rule of Life and Service. Br. Stanley Tanner will serve as Prior. Other chapter officers, elected September 27, are: Br. Thomas Blackstone, Sub-Prior; Sr. Amy Sawtelle, Chaplain; Karen Munson, Formation Officer.

As previously announced, the Southeastern Ohio Chapter, held its organizational meeting July 19 and continues to meet monthly. Chapter officers are: Br. Brian McKee, Prior; Br. Robert Howell, Sub-Prior; Br. Farris Wilhite, Chancellor, Sr. Elissa Wilhite, Spiritual Formation

Officer. Br. Steve Sullivan, Provincial Companion for Ohio, will meet with this chapter in December.

Br. John Taylor, Prior, received the Chartering Certificate for the Trinity Chapter of north Texas, whose formation was reported in the last issue of The Font. This diverse group of women, men, laity and clergy representing two annual conferences will meet on the first Monday of each month. Sr. Rebecca Grogan will serve as Sub-Prior.

Two chapters were discontinued at our fall gathering. The Wesley-Allen Chapter (Detroit area) and the Wyoming Conference Chapter are no longer meeting and have no members to draw on for future leadership. As I look back on our time together in Pittsburgh, many such moments come to mind, but one in particular stands out for me. It happened as Br. Mark Stamm presided at the Table for the last time before Br. Dan would be installed to succeed him in the office of Abbott. Ever alert to the needs of others, Br. Dan noticed that Br. Mark needed the service book with the text of the Great Thanksgiving elevated for easier reading. So it was that two brothers stood at the Table, the one to preside, the other to provide his support. I took a mental snapshot of this, so eloquently did it speak to me of the spirit of servant-leadership that lives in The Order of Saint Luke. What a picture! It speaks a thousand words and more to me still. I will treasure it always.

A Tribute to Br. Richard M. Hoffman from Br. Ted Hoffmann, OSL

On June 19, 2008 my brother died. Richard (Dick) M. Hoffmann was born on February 17, 1936 in Dunbar, WV. He was a member of The Order of Saint Luke.

Thus, as some of you know, he and I became Br. Br. to each other. Every email that we exchanged was addressed to Br. Br. and signed Br. Br.

Br. Br.'s health was such that he never was able to attend an annual retreat or in any other way get to meet in person a fellow member of OSL. There was not a local chapter near him for him to attend. Br. Dick did meet many of you on the Cyber Chapter which was his link, except through me, to the Order.

He occasionally corresponded with Br. Taylor and Br Brent by email.

I am writing this, which I said to the General Chapter, that he would have you know that he loved the Order and he loved each of you. He prayed for you and with you each day through the Daily Office. I think it is significant that, even though he was a Marine, he was buried in his alb and scapular.
