Chapter news will continue to be drawn from reports made to the Provincial General. However, chapters are always welcome to provide the latest information (or corrections) about their events by directly submitting an article to *The Font*.

Perpetual Reminder: If the contact person for your chapter or association changes due to an election of new officers, or if you are the contact person and you <u>move to a new assignment</u> or <u>change your internet</u> <u>service provider</u> (AOL, MSN, Yahoo, etc.), please be sure to provide the Provincial General with updated contact information.

A group that is in the initial stages of reformation is the **Arkansas Chapter**. Br. Terry L. Sager has met with individuals during annual conference (mid-year) and they agreed to remain connected through e-mail and attempt to find a date in November to meet as a group. Officers will be selected at a later date. Br. Terry reports nine contacts.

J. Warren Smith, Faculty Advisor for the **Duke Divinity School Chapter** writes: "The Duke Chapter remains inactive. If and when students are interested, a chapter will be formed. I, however, will not be the faculty advisor. Blessings on you."

The **Houston Chapter** is currently inactive (as of October 2008). Sr. Cheryl Smith notes, "I will renew my vows this month, as will others, but we have no active meetings. Perhaps in the new year we will have a chance to re-form. We are currently all struggling to recover from Hurricane Ike, and I cannot imagine adding another thing to anybody's plate. I am familiar with the Order's structure and will contact the appropriate sources should our chapter come back together."

Br. Andrew Ritts reported: "The frequency of the **Missouri Chapter's** meetings has been irregular, mostly situational, based on conference events. We still are looking for a replacement for prior after Br. Joe Barnes' resignation." [P. G. Note: Some members associated with this chapter may relate to the St. Paul School of Theology Chapter; for others, membership may have lapsed.]

No report for the **Northern Oasis Chapter** has been filed since October 2006. An e-mail address failure for Sr. Linda Jean Harris may have prevented effective communication. If anyone related to this chapter can provide an update, please contact the Provincial General.

The **St. Benedict Chapter** meets bimonthly during the academic year at Candler School of Theology. "We currently have an operating base of 12-15 members with 50 who have expressed interest. We are early yet in the school year and are juggling schedules in order to facilitate attendance," reports Br. Scott Wilks, Prior. *[P.G. Note: On September 10, Br. To assist in the formation of the new members who have joined our Chapter, we arrange pfr a monthly Spiritual/Prayer Formation Session at the monthly meetings. The first session for all was "Praying the

Daily Offices". Each month we have explored different topics, including: Praying With Icons, Contemplative Prayer, Susannah Wesley and her spirituality, Christian Spirituality. We are focusing heavily on PRAYER. The above only works when you have members who attend regularly however. I encourage members to keep a spiritual journal/prayer journal if they are comfortable with that.

A focus on the Daily Office is important to us. We are alternating our meetings between two churches - at one church (every other month) we have Sung Morning Prayer/potluck lunch/spiritual formation; at the other church we have the Eucharist (when a Celebrant is available) and then lunch together at a restaurant. By doing the Morning Prayer Office 6 times a year, we model how to pray the office and encourage members to be able to use the Psalms for prayer.

Sisters and Brothers:

I have on my shelves a book by Majid Ali, a doctor from Pakistan now practicing in New York, with the fascinating title of *The Cortical Monkey and Healing*. If you're wondering what a cortical monkey is, know that <u>you</u> who are reading this are one – an ape-like creature who is endowed with a cerebral cortex. Dr. Ali's mission is to encourage you to <u>think</u>. And he especially wants you to think about how you take care of yourself – which is why I am sharing this with you.

We are all under stress of one sort or another. That's a normal part of life and, as Ali points out, even more so for us, living as we do in a high-speed world where we sit a lot, with a food-delivery system that pumps a lot more sugar into our bodies than is good for us, a degraded environment, and a medical system that puts more emphasis on knocking symptoms <u>down</u> than on providing the supports to hold us <u>up</u> in a healthy way. Dr. Ali wants us to think about what we do in support of our own health.

Picture the façade of a Greek Temple– wide triangular face all of stone with carvings across the front, surmounted by a roof of stone. So the engineering part of your cerebral cortex wants to know what holds all that weight up. As you keep looking you see four heavy Corinthian columns. They are obviously under tremendous stress but together they have held up under all that stone for thousands of years.

In Dr. Ali's model, that image represents the Four Pillars of good self-care: <u>Nutrition, Stress-</u> <u>Management, Fitness</u> and <u>Allergy and Chemicals</u>. These have to do with what you do to provide support for your own health by taking care for good nutrition, by engaging in those practices that help you manage stress, by getting enough exercise to keep yourself fit and by avoiding exposure to allergens and chemicals as much as you can in the real world we all live in.

I learned about Dr. Ali's work a few years ago when dealing with a health threat of my own. I felt very vulnerable at the time. I felt threatened by something I didn't understand very well, and very worried about how serious it might be. There were other burdens that I was carrying at the time, but this felt like the kind of heavy snow and ice that sometimes brings down a flat-roofed building in New England in wintertime. Not wanting to collapse, and with the help of a nutritionist who coached me through the whole process, I spent a lot of time assessing the Four Pillars of my own life and making such adjustments as I could to strengthen them. I will know better in January when I go for a blood test and an annual consultation with my hematologist; however, based on how I have felt for the last year, I can tell you that I have <u>not</u> collapsed despite some particularly heavy stress along the way.

What kind of loving, pastoral care are you giving to your own body, mind and spirit? What do you eat? What attitudes do you cultivate to help you bear up under stress? How much exercise are you getting?

What can you do to protect yourself in a toxic environment? And to suggest a fifth and very important Pillar, how is your prayer life going? Or as used to be asked in early Methodist class meetings, How is it with your soul?"

As a community, we are <u>so</u> good at caring for one another. Brothers and Sisters, please be sure to take care of yourselves, too!
