In gratitude for our union with you in the baptismal covenant, we offer you the life you have given us and our prayers for each other. Hear our cry:

for a sense of connection with others in the Order...

for grace to live for you

and each other in keeping the Rule of Life and Service

for forgiveness of the brother or sister whose actions or words caused us hurt or harm...

While not all of us have or use the Order's *Daily Office* for daily prayer, my sense is that each of us yearns to experience the Order with a “sense of connection with others in the Order...” I will confess to you, my siblings, that this sense of connection and mutual care is one of my primary concerns as your abbot. “Love one another” is our vocation in all relationships. In the Order, it is how we enact our life beyond being a dispersed group of like minded sacramentalists. (Besides, who says we are like minded? Not in any gathering of Lucans I have been in! We are a diverse bunch, but a bunch we are!)

On the Cyberchapter, Sr. Heather Josselyn-Cranson, our hagiographer, keeps reminding us of our wider connections with those who have gone to another shore and sing in a greater light.

At the May meeting of the Council One of our members, a retired physician, took me aside and said, “If there is someone suffering in the Order that you want me to call on, and they are within a

seventy-five mile radius, I am willing to go visit them.” I said to her, “Do you mean as a physician?” She said, “No, just to be there with them and for them—as one who brings the care of the Order to a member.” I was deeply grateful for this sister's grace and readiness to enact our connection.

Another member of the Order wrote to me, “I felt a bit disconnected from this annual conference [session], especially since I was unable to have lunch with two spiritual friends who have meant so much to me over the years.” He named two members of the Order, one of

whom had recently died, and then continued, “We will be celebrating K's Service of Death and Resurrection this Saturday and I find myself contemplating how important these spiritual friendships are for our spiritual and psychological health, not to mention healthy spiritual accountability. That has certainly been the case with the Order of Saint Luke—the one group within the church I can trust completely with ‘the good, the bad, and the ugly’.”

That, friends, is a high affirmation of what we can be for and with each other. I encourage each of us to listen to the promptings of the Spirit. When you think of a brother or sister, or feel a nudge to reach out, do it. Make time in your chapter meetings to share how it is with each other's souls and to share one another's burdens. If another member seems to have fallen off the planet, be a good shepherd and seek that one out.

And, do make every effort to realize the “connection” with each other by attending the annual retreat this fall in Pittsburgh. For those of you who have yet to experience the delight of common worship, table fellowship and story telling, this might be your “homecoming” to the delight of your brothers and sisters.

As I say that, I recognize that many of you live outside the United States and for whom attending the retreat is not feasible. Know that we love you, whether or not you can attend the retreat. Your faithfulness and witness in the sacramental life means much to the Order and we rejoice in the ways we live our connection together.

(adapted from the forms that now appear in the UMBOW and the brief service now in BOS in light of how we've used them at recent retreats)

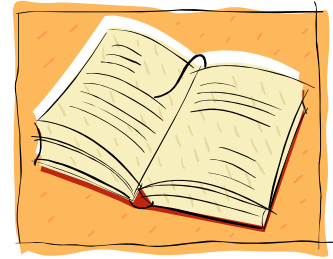
Service of Reconciliation

From the Officer for Pastoral Care

Sisters and Brothers:

One of the items on my “To-Do” list is to draw up a list of the things I do as the Officer for Pastoral Care. No, let’s not start a rumor here; this is not a signal that I’m departing any time soon. Rather, it’s in preparation for the day when it will be time for me to step aside to make way for another pastoral care officer. This position is one of several “abbatial” appointments, e.g. offices that are filled by appointment of the Abbot, in contrast to the three general officers (Prior General, Provincial General and Chancellor General) who, with the Abbot, are elected by the members of the Order. Job descriptions for these abbatial appointments may become helpful to the Abbot when he/she selects persons to fill them; also to those persons in considering such a request. Since I was the Order’s first Officer for Pastoral Care, and therefore worked out a job description pretty much “on the job” with a few dollops of trial and error at the beginning, it makes sense for me to write something up at this point.

From the beginning, I have seen it as my primary mission to find ways to bring out the best of us as a pastoral community rather than presuming to do all the pastoral care for us myself. Pastoral care on the part of a pastoral community is what I call the “sacrament of *koinonia*.” It is true that I am available for pastoral conversation with our members; in fact, I do engage in those conversations, for the most part by email and telephone. Nevertheless, I always look upon those conversations as parts of the big picture, which is the pastoral community that is The Order of Saint Luke.

In the News section that follows, you will see that, among the items this time is notice of one of our brothers who died just recently. This was not someone I had ever met, spoken to, or corresponded with. I learned of his death by way of a post to the Cyber Chapter from one of our sisters. You'll see a quote from one of our brothers who followed up on that with a very moving tribute to this man's life and ministry as a teacher with a wonderful heart for struggling students in need of a strong helping hand. I could have had no knowledge of either his life or his death without the witness of those who wrote to us about him. As it is, now we all can know of his life and work. And we have the opportunity to send our respects to his wife (who is also one of our sisters) and to his family.

So, brothers and sisters, I would encourage you to practice this sacrament of *koinonia*. One of the things that I do is to act as a conduit to the community of news of our members' lives and ministries. When you have important news of your own, be sure to let me know so that, with your permission, I can share it through the News section in *The Font*. When you become aware of news of others, if you will let me know, I will do my best to be in touch with them and, with their permission, to share that in the News. Prayer requests are part of that news – very important for us to share.

Just to be clear, what's published in the News comes there with permission of the persons involved. I am also interested in hearing from you if you need to discuss something with me that you consider confidential and would therefore not want to have published.

In his book, *Food for Pilgrims*, concerning our Order's Rule of Life and Service, Br. Dwight Vogel lifted up the experience of the first Christians as reported in the opening chapters of the Book of Acts, where we read that, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." Luke goes on to say that, "Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God ... " That's what I have in mind as a model for the sacrament of *koinonia*. Even though we are dispersed, therefore can only rarely break bread together face-to-face, you can help make that glad, generous sharing possible. Don't be shy. Write to me or call and, with permission, I will pass the news along.
