Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Like each of you I have an "other" life—the vocation of living my baptism and the Rule of Life and Service in my zip code. This "other" life has included for more than a year seeking approval of construction drawings and getting a building permit. Our Hawaii family lives in an "ohana" (family) house, a duplex. With our son and his family growing there is need for another bedroom and bath in their unit. Starting in early July, the actual construction began—"contemplative construction", as I quipped in a comment to Br. Dwight Vogel.



We live close to the beach so code requires that any new construction be 14 feet above sea level. Now well into the project and aided by a family member from Maui who is an experienced framer, the columns, decking, walls, and roof skin are in place. Hurricane straps are installed. Stairs, windows, doors, wiring, plumbing and finish work are yet to come.

I can tell you with sore muscles, cuts, and bruises that architectural concepts and drawings are one thing; the actual act of construction is quite another! I am amazed at the exhausting effort, innovative adjustments, and skill required to translate what the mind conceives into actuality.

In Proverbs 8, Wisdom personified, speaks, "When [God] marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him like a master worker." (vss. 29-30) Likely playing on this, John writes of the Word, "All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being." (Jn 1:3)

I confess that when I read these texts and Genesis 1 I tend to imagine a kind of effortlessness; the divine life simply speaking something into being like brushing a box of tooth pick across the table and a log cabin or suspension bridge come into being.

However, tonight with tired back and aching shoulders I wonder, does God really make a world, push up mountains, scoop out seas, and shape the birds, fish, and all the creatures, including humans with no exertion beyond mere thought. Yes, I do remember something of my seminary Hebrew class and word studies of *debar* –the "word" God speaks that goes forth as an act, an event of encounter in and with creation.

But might we imagine Creator God sweating, pounding, cutting, and hammering in a continuing creation? Will the new Jerusalem (Rev. 21) come easily? Or, is it even now a construction project, demanding hammer, saw, and level, outwitting every opposing force. In Jeremiah, God contrasts the gauzy "dreams" of the false prophets with the prophets who speak God's word faithfully, and then continues, "Is not my word (*dabar*)...like a hammer...?" (Jer. 23:23-29) See Brian Wren's hymn, "Bring Many Names" for an example of such imaginative expansion of our vision of God engaged in creation, justice, and redemption. (The Faith We Sing, no. 2047).

And does not our baptism demand our participation zip code by zip code as those who "speak" forcefully and faithfully God's Word *in deed* as well as voice? Are we not "hammered" by the divine Word becoming ever more malleable as the new humanity in Christ. Let this be our ascetical practice: to give

ourselves to a rigorous co-construction effort in God's continuing creation until at last from the throne in the new heaven and the new earth we hear "It is done." (Rev. 21:6).

I look forward to seeing many of you at the retreat in Pittsburgh this October, where we will in worship and holy conferencing encourage one another in keeping the Rule of Life and Service.

The activity level of the various OSL Chapters and Associations is a very important part of our life together as a dispersed community. As new members discover and then join the Order, there is a developing system for welcoming and relating our new siblings to local groups. It is a joy to be able to tell a new member that the chapter or association that is nearest to him/her is active and meeting regularly. Chapter reports



are the primary source for knowing your group's activity level, and knowing where you meet is helpful in making connections with our new members.

Here is the news from the local chapters and associations for this issue of the font, based on reports shared at the spring Council meeting:

• The **Cyber Chapter** continues to be a connecting thread for many of our OSL kindred. As an online group they "meet" 24/7/362 (the list goes silent from the end of Maundy Thursday through the Easter Vigil). The chapter has a worldwide membership of 440 subscribers. The content of discussion [this spring] has included: prayer requests, heresy, Christian Atheism and Apsycheism and Liturgy, Ordination, Ecumenical Eucharist **Joys/Challenges:** We rejoice in continued growth both in the numbers of subscribers but especially in the depth of our conversations, community and care for one another in Christ. The Cyber officers are: Taylor Burton-Edwards, Prior, and Sue Moore, Prior Suffragan.

- The Middle Tennessee Association is currently inactive.
- Since October, the **Okalahoma Chapter** held two annual retreats at the St. Crispin's Retreat Center in Shawnee OK. The first (Oct. 26-27) focused on Wesley and the Sacraments, featuring Rev. Michael Bartley. The second (Feb. 15-16) focused on preaching and healing and wholeness with Rev, Dr. Roberto Escambia as our guest speaker. Plans were made to worship together at semi-annual meetings of the Orders (Elders, Deacons, Local Pastors) as well as to create an advertising space for the Order at our Annual Conference as well as meeting for a meal at Conference. Joys/Challenges: The largest challenge we face is the large geographical area that our chapter covers, which makes whole chapter meetings less, frequent than desired. Our joy is that we are holding our annual retreat and expanding our presence to both Orders Meetings and Annual Conference. All chapter officers were recently re-elected: Br. Eric Snyder, Prior; Br. Don Whitman, Sub-Prior; Br. David Mingus, Chancellor.
- The **St. Paul School of Theology Chapter** meets on the third Wednesday of every month. New officers tentatively starting next fall are Prior: Christopher Eshelman, Sub-Prior: Jeff Jaekley, Chancellor: Carla Gunn, Spiritual formation: Carly Hodge.
- The **Trinity Chapter** is alive and well and usually meets on the first Thursday of each month in the chapel of the North Texas Conference (NTC) Center. There are 18 active members. The normal schedule is worship at 12:00 noon followed by lunch (this year a "brown bag"). The membership is currently all UM, elders, deacons, and laity, and all but one are connected with the NTC. We share information and prayer with the Perkins Chapter, and the prior of that chapter is one of our members.

We are pleased to announce that three new OSL groups are in the formation process. I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and those who come after you may live, loving the Lord your God ... for that means life to you and length of days. – Deuteronomy 30:19f

Sisters and Brothers:

Who has blessed you? Who has cursed you? And what's the difference between a blessing and a curse, anyway? Important questions, methinks, because we have all been both blessed and cursed – sometimes even by the same people! And it makes all the difference whether we spend our days saying Yes! to the curses or to the blessings. Because choosing to say Yes! to the blessings is to say Yes! to life itself:

- Yes! to God, who has blessed us ...
- Yes! to our neighbors, blessing them as we have been blessed.
- Yes! to ourselves, the blessed ones.

We can only build a future of life on the foundation of the Yes's – the blessings; never on a foundation of the No's. We can imagine a future (which is where we will live the rest of our lives) rich with more of what we love. Or we can do the opposite, focusing on getting rid of what we hate. We are free to choose. But it is what we love that will lead us into the life that by God's grace is before us.

So, what will help us with a choice like that? One of the most important things we can do for each other is to show a deep interest in one another. Carl Rogers used to speak of "prizing" the people he counseled. To prize someone communicates what it is to be loved, respected and cared for well beyond the usual "Hi! How are ya'?" formalities. Child psychologists call that "mirroring." Mirroring happens when an adult caregiver says to a child, "Wow! That was great! <u>You</u> are so great!!" And which of us ever outgrows treasuring the experience of receiving that kind of message? Indeed, it spurs us on to seek a life of doing more of what we love so much that we do it with greatness. When we do that, we create a future we can live into with delight.

I think that prizing, along with prayer, is one of the hallmarks of pastoral care. It is the mark of a pastoral community. It's why I get excited every couple of months by a growing list of news items that we have to share here. Each one of these postings registers someone's greatness – that they are deeply-prized members of our community. Whether the news is full of joy or concern, and whatever may lie ahead, each of our brothers and sisters is a sign of life for us. That's a blessing. We can, and regularly do, say Yes! to blessings like that.
