From the desk of the Abbot Dear Sisters and Brothers,

My summer has been one of travel for personal events and ministry--about 35,000 miles! I am grateful for the frequent flyer miles I had and for events that accrued more. Seeing family in England and New York, preaching and lecturing in Korea, attending my 50th high school reunion, visiting Br. Hoyt and Martha at Chautauqua, days of retreat, and sharing in the North American Association for the



Catechumenate meeting in California: I am glad for all of it and delighted now to be home with my beloved. Many of you have also had ventures for pleasure and service. I look forward to seeing you and sharing God's work in our midst when gathering at Montserrat Retreat this coming October.

I am currently reading Maria Boulding's Gateway to Resurrection. A Benedictine nun faced with terminal cancer, she wrote the book from within that journey. It is far more than an intensely personal narrative. Her short life horizon launched her into a deep and powerful theological and biblical reflection on the mission of the Trinity and the paschal mystery embedded in the realities of living in the world as it actually is, and the weakness and brokenness that is the gateway to resurrection. Forgiveness, she asserts, both God's and ours, is central to life as we live in community, whether the divine-human encounter, family, Order, church or larger world. Said that way, you may say, "Ho, hum. Forgiveness, yes, but I heard all that before." Not so fast!

What Boulding does is to give context to forgiveness. Luke's idealized poetry (Acts 2:42-47) is true, but only so alongside the prose of Monday morning disenchantments of Ananias and Sapphira's deception (Acts 5), the squabbles of the Hebrews and the Hellenists (Acts 6), contention between Peter and Paul (Galatians 2), and the parting of Paul and Barnabas (Acts 15). She says that Luke's vision haunts the imagination of the great monastic founders. Here, I would include Br Romey P. Marshall and others in the mid-1940s, and Br. Michael O'Donnell and others in the mid-1980s, when the Order took another major step toward being a religious community living out its Rule of Life and Service.

Life in community requires embodied and enacted forgiveness. Why? To wipe up (not wipe out!) the messiness and disenchantment of it all. Messiness and disenchantment are part of all relationships. I wonder if this isn't part of why our chapters lapse into inactivity so frequently. Chapters form, informed by Luke's poetry, but then the prosaic disenchantments breaks the spell. The enchantment is overwhelmed and the chapter folds or members fall away, unless there is forgiveness and acceptance of the weaknesses and tensions of our Peters and "Paulas".

Jesus washing the disciples' feet (John 13) embodies this address of the mess and John calls what Jesus does "glorification." Here, dirt is accepted and made the disciples "part" of him when they had fallen into "no part" of him (13:8). In this way the community is restored, the chapter is reborn, and the divine joy is rekindled in the self-emptying (kenosis, Phil 2) of cross, towel and basin. Theosis or deification (in Wesley and the West "sanctification") as Basil understood it includes washing the feet of the poor—even the poor feet of sisters and brothers who, truth be told, have disappointed us. (Col. 3:12-14)

Room for failure has to be part of the grace we extend to each other in the Order, our churches, and and families, and for the recognition that failure is where the paschal mystery happens! (Kindle location 160).

So, sisters and brothers, as you reflect on your life in the Order, who has failed you? Who has disenchanted you by "things done and left undone"? Can you make room for him or her, and recognize that there between you is where Easter waits to happen? This is tough, but it is about a basic understanding and practice of the Spirit's perfecting love in us and among us. How will you practice forgiveness in the Order and in your chapter in order to live between the poetry and the prose? I commend you to God and the work of God's grace,

Recent communication with folks in the Philippines indicate that a new OSL chapter or association may be in formation there. A previously formed



Philippine Association was discontinued in 2010, so this is exciting news. This time around they may organize into three sections that are more workable with the geography of the multi-island nation. If we receive their Covenanting Document in time, we will take action on their request at our General Council meeting this fall.

Speaking of our upcoming meeting, which happens in conjunction with our Retreat in October, I will be asking for reports from chapters, associations, groups in formation and local area contact persons in early September. This time around I will be requesting a list of members' gender and ethnicity. I don't need membership lists, just the appropriate numbers. This is in keeping with our status as an Affiliated Association of the General Board of Discipleship.

In the meantime, here is the news from the local chapters and associations based on reports prepared for our Spring Council meeting:

Our CyberChapter continues to meet on line 24/7/365.25. The chapter has a worldwide membership of around 475 members. We are growing at a stable pace. Ongoing topics for conversations include seasonal practices and theological discussions as well as prayer support. The Cyber "officers" are: Taylor Burton-Edwards and Sue Moore, Co-Moderators.

The Illinois Great Rivers Conference Chapter meets the fourth Wednesday of the month, September through May, excluding December. This year our chapter has studied Br. Abbot Dan's book, Patterned by Grace. Our joys are our members and the election of new officers. Our immediate challenge is to coordinate the celebration of the Eucharist at Annual Conference worship services. At the close of Annual Conference, the new officers will be: Michael Mayfield, Prior; Lindsay Churchman, Sub-Prior; Lee Legg, Scribe.

Br. Irving Cotto reported on the New Jersey – Pennsylvania Latino Chapter: Our chapter meets on the last Tuesday of every month; we rotate our meeting place. We begin with Eucharist, followed by study, business and lunch. Members take turns at leading worship, designing liturgy, preaching and leading the study. Since October 2011 we have continued our study of This Holy Mystery (Spanish version). The discussion has been helpful and well received. We pray for each other's concerns, however, we follow up on those concerns beyond our monthly meetings. We continue to look at a publishing project. We would like to put together a resource in Spanish including liturgies for all occasions developed by individual members of the chapter as a whole. Recently, our Sub-Prior submitted her resignation, and the chapter is due for elections. The date has not been determined. Chapter officers are: Br. Irving Cotto, Prior; Br. Manolo Sardiñas, Chancellor, Br. Joel A. Fernández, Chaplain.

"Unfortunately we have not been able to meet during this year," reports Br. Julio R. Vargas-Vidal of the Puerto Rico Chapter. "Our last meeting was during Lent 2010. I hope this year we can amend this." [Provincial General's note: We are awaiting notification that one or more members of the Puerto Rico Chapter will be able to attend our fall Retreat with the scholarship assistance we have offered them.]

The Southeastern Ohio Chapter meets monthly and holds Eucharist every other month, alternating with sung Morning Prayer. In February, we did John Wesley's Covenant Service

from Wesley's original text in its complete form. We rejoice to continue with our monthly meetings. Br. Daniel, our new member, has become quite active. We are working through our challenge of finding Presiders for Eucharist as best we can. Chapter officers are: Brian McKee, Prior and Robert Howell, Sub-Prior. Right now, we do not have other officers. We have no treasury as everything operates from donation of our members. Our chaplain moved out of state and hasn't been replaced as of yet.

Sisters and Brothers:

After much prayer and thought, and upon consultation with Br. Abbot Daniel, the time has come to let you know that I will soon step aside as your Pastoral Care Officer. I have been at this just long enough to be having a little trouble remembering exactly when I started, but I think it has been a six year run. I have served with two abbots, from when Br. Abbot Mark Stamm first appointed me until

now.

This office, which did not exist before, was first discussed in a Council meeting with Br. Mark presiding. The feeling at that time was that we needed someone to serve our community as a conduit for sharing important joys and passages in members' lives. That was the genesis of the News section which always follows this message in The Font. Beyond that, I pretty much began with a free hand to develop the office as I perceived our pastoral needs.

The one instruction that Br. Mark gave me was a reminder to be sure and maintain confidentiality. So, I made it a policy from the start that any news posted in The Font would need the permission of the brother or sister concerned. I also learned very quickly that I needed to ask that person to check an item that I had drafted for accuracy so that names would be spelled correctly, and so that there could be corrections or additions to what I had written. Many of you have received emails from me around the middle of the month just before publication of an issue of The Font with the subject line, "Font News." That's what that's all about.

Other than news gathering, I have tried to be readily available for pastoral conversation when desired – usually by telephone or email. Being dispersed as much as we are, face-to-face conversations have almost always been limited to times when we gathered for retreat or Council meetings. However, when that has been possible I have treasured the opportunity. Some of these conversations took place privately when that was what was needed. Many – too many to count – took place while going from one place to another within the building where we were meeting, during walks outside, over meals, or lingering after a meeting or meal. On one or two occasions (usually late at night because of busy retreat schedules), I have met with groups who needed to debrief something that had happened – for example, a trip to the memorial to those killed in the bombing of the federal office building in Oklahoma City led to a very powerful time of sharing and reflection that night. These are experiences I will never forget.

Serving as Pastoral Care Officer has been important to me in the process of my own spiritual formation. News gathering and pastoral conversation have certainly informed my prayer life. And answering this call to service has deepened my explorations into what it means to live into the whole of our Rule of Life and Service. I thank all of you for your encouragement and for your pastoral care for me and Sr. Amy along the way. I have never fancied that I could – or should – offer all the pastoral care needed within this community, so I thank you for the many ways you demonstrate love and care for one another.

My plans at this point are to continue in another position I have held for several years as Provincial Companion for New England. At present, there are some 31 of us spread across the six New England states. There's a lot of isolation as a consequence of that. I think we need greater clarity as to how we can support one another and also provide a measure of accountability. In an Order where no more than a 10th of our members are able to get to national gatherings, and in a time when economics are increasingly restricting precious funds for that kind of travel, I see a need for strengthening community in the provinces and helping with the formation of local chapters where that is possible. So, I'm pulling back from one responsibility in hopes of becoming more focused on the other.

Unfortunately, it turns out that I will not be able to travel to Dallas for the retreat this October. However, I have indicated my readiness to continue to serve until a successor has been appointed, and to make myself available to that person, as desired, to assist in making a smooth transition. And I hope to see many of you next year in Pittsburgh.

Read on and you will see some of the latest News of our beloved community. For now, until a new Pastoral Care Officer has been appointed, I encourage you to continue being in touch with me when you have news you wish to share or if you desire pastoral conversation with me. Br. Charles Wiggins is a newly-elected Methodist bishop serving in Tanzania. Br. Charles has written the letter that follows to Sr. Sue Moore. It is very full (in the fullest sense of "full") but far too much to condense as we usually do and still do it justice. So, we include it here in its entirety. <u>revwig@me.com</u>

Dear Sr. Moore,

First, let me thank you for all your efforts regarding the Font. Since I live in the bush on the edge of the Serengeti National Park in Tanzania, without it, I would have no knowledge of the OSL. I read each one more than once remembering many whom I know and learning of those I don't. So, thank you.

On the news front, in 2009 I was elected bishop and consecrated as same in December of 2010. I am now Bishop of the Methodist Church in Tanzania, Mara and Mwanza Regions. There is a presiding bishop who is bishop of all Tanzania. While these titles sound grand, our whole denomination only numbers 4,000, but ten years ago it only numbered 200, so we are making great strides.

The presiding bishop loves all the liturgical richness that mud churches can bear and we teach our pastors the same. We had a crozier custom made for him (I have to use a cane to walk and couldn't handle both), but he uses it in every service. Our robes are designed for the African heat but they are rich in symbols nonetheless. Now, I get to wear a purple clergy shirt (imported from the U.S.) and no longer have to worry about what color to wear. Of course, there is no pay and I help the church financially as much as possible on our limited budget. Still, I am referred to as Bishop (Askofu in Swahili) by just about everyone.

Joel continues to lead the Worship Committee of his district. In addition to his local church assignment, he teaches Evangelism, Bible and Theology courses at the Divinity School of Aldersgate College in the city of Baguio. He also teaches Sacramental Theology and Christian Education at the Theology department of John Wesley College in Cagayan Province.

Br. Norlie Vilog and **Br. Many Valdez**, both from Llocus Sur Province, were ordained as elders at annual conference, which was held at Sto. Tomas UMC, Candon City. Br. Norlie was appointed as pastor of Sto Tomas UMC. Br. Many was appointed to oversee two congregations.

Sr. Lily Ledesma is a minister of the United Church of Christ in the Philippines (UCCP). She teaches courses in Christian education at Union Theological Seminary-Philippines, the oldest protestant seminary in the country founded by the Methodists and Presbyterians in 1907.

Br. Joel's District Superintendent Rev. Pete Torio and his wife have expressed their intention to join the Order. Two provisional ministers (both women) and several elders and local pastors are also interested. From Br. Joel's post, it is clear that OSL is brim full of activities and plans including a national gathering focused on the history, vision, mission, and Rule of Life and Service of the Order. You may anticipate hearing more about this via our Provincial General Br. George Crisp in due course.

Br. Joel concludes, "Please continue to lift us in your prayers.
