Fostering connections within the Order of Saint Luke

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The Feast of Christmas continues to its conclusion on January 6 with The Epiphany, expanding from the manger in Bethlehem to the manifestation of Jesus to the gentiles—the global, universal thrust of the gospel toward the New Creation.



However, we Christians have a long way to go. I read this morning of the "broom fight" in the Basilica of the Holy Nativity in Bethlehem. Apparently Armenian and Orthodox monks, who share jurisdiction over the holy shrine (along with Roman Catholics), got into a melee as they were cleaning. You can hear the shouts, "Church fight! Church fight!"

If it weren't so tragic, it would be laughable: monks and priests duking it out over the birthplace of the Prince of Peace! (Bethlehem and Bedlam are not that far apart!) Of course, we Western Christians, we Protestants, would never resort to such antics! Imagine police having to break up a scuffle among OSL members at St. Paul's Monastery in Pittsburgh, or pitched battle on the floor of General Conference in Tampa next spring. It wouldn't happen at the General convention of the Episcopal Church or the General Synod of the ELCA. Or could it? In this day of extremism and ideological lines in the sand, "Mene Mene Tekel and Parsin" might appear on the walls of any number of our ecclesial gatherings. Christianity, as seen by the "gentile" world is on display and the often "the hand writing is on the wall."

That is a bone for the critics! However, I remain hopeful about the leaven of the gospel among us and our growing recognition of the church's missional character. Apart from the headlines and the notoriety that go with them, we in the Order have a role to play in "bringing Christ's healing grace to the whole creation." That widened vision now incorporated into our Collect reminds us of the global work of Christ.

I am currently reading John Michael Talbot's *The World Is My Cloister: Living from the Hermit Within* (Orbis, 2010). The title comes from a line from St. Francis of Assisi: "The world is my cloister, my body is my cell, and my soul is the hermit within." (Kindle Loc. 50-52) Talbot's recognizes a phenomenon of our time: while the number of residential monastics and nuns is decreasing, the numbers of people seeking to live in association with monastic communities by attending to the inner hermit is increasing.

"The inner hermit is that part of our soul that longs for silence in a noisy world, hungers for peace, and bears witness, with or without words, to 'the peace of Christ that passes all understanding' (Col 3:15)." (Kindle Loc. 57-59)

My sense of who we are as an Order is very much in line with this. While we have historically had a charism for scholarship, study and practice related to liturgy and the sacraments, we

increasingly understand that "seeking the sacramental life"—living from the inner hermit who listens to the deep voices within—is critical to fulfilling our vows and living Christ's peace in a noisy world.

So, 2012 is upon us with all of it noise and possibilities for listening from within the silence. I commend each of you to this life cloistered in the world for the life of the world. I pray for each of you the grace to find the balance in the inward and outward journey.

Every four years the priors, or the chapter representative, of the various local chapters are charged with nominating officers for the General Chapter of the Order of St. Luke. The four general officers are: Abbot, Prior General, Chancellor General, and Provincial General. Individuals may suggest themselves for consideration; chapters and associations may, as a group, suggest a person for consideration. Sisters and Brothers:

In his lead editorial for the December 13, 2011 issue of *The Christian Century*, John M. Buchanan offers this about the Incarnation:

Incarnation means that this world is God's creation and that God loved it so much that God came here to be with us. The story could not be more this-worldly: pregnant, unwed teenager, perplexed fiancé, arduous journey, inn full of raucous guests, barn full of animals, labor, pain, blood, birth and shepherds.

Oh, how the truth of that plays out in our world and in our own lives! I'm writing this on the Fourth Day of Christmas, which is the Feast Day the Holy Innocents, a day that recalls the slaughter of defenseless little children caught and killed in the web of political ambition and cruelty in the world to which Jesus was born. "Martyrs in fact though not in will," Augustine called them; "buds killed by the frost of persecution the moment they showed themselves." Would that this were only a once-upon-a-time story. We need not look far in our own world to find the innocent ones being cut down by those same ambitions and cruelty. Nor can we take refuge by withdrawing into our private and personal lives. None of us is immune to the illnesses and struggles that come to meet us among our families, friends and neighbors. As Buchanan sums it up:

[The story] could not be more human or more earthy, and that is the point ... It is this world that God entered on that first Christmas and enters again and again.

Read on and you will see some of the latest News of our beloved community. It tells of the passages in our lives, some happy, some inexpressibly sad, and all, in one way or another, very earthy: Ordinations, stories of ministry, two new babies, illness and personal injury and recovery, four deaths (actually five, counting one that was of a beloved dog who's death was mourned as we grieve over the loss of any family member), messages and greetings from two of our brothers who live far, far away from most of us, literally on the opposite side of the world. And all of this, I take it, constitutes a call to love one another so much that, despite the barriers of distance, we use every means possible to be present to one another.
