Br. George provided the following report to the Council:



1. **Discontinuing Chapters** – Br. Matthias Tanner reports that all of the officers in the **Barnabas Chapter** have resigned and no one has stepped forward to lead. Although those interested in the Order will gather for prayer at annual conference, Br. Terry Sager is no longer able to work at developing the **Arkansas Chapter**.

Due to his personal health concerns, and a general lack of interest, Br. David Eichelberger has not been able to develop a chapter in the **Pittsburgh Area**. I recommend that we discontinue tracking or developing these groups. As always, we would welcome chapter development in these areas in the future.

- 2. Seminary Chapters Last fall, Dr. Ian McFarland, who at one time succeeded Br. Don Saliers as Faculty Advisor, reported that the St. Benedict Chapter of the Order is not listed among the campus groups and no advisor is assigned. If anyone has contacts at Candler, I'd appreciate an update.
- 3. **In Formation / Transitioning** Reorganization work continues in the <u>Boston University</u> <u>Chapter</u> under the leadership of Br. Jeffrey Cox. In March, we received an inquiry about the Order from Rev. Luis Hildalgo Ruiz in <u>Chile</u>. He was sent what documents we have translated into Spanish, but it is too early to see if an OSL chapter will be formed there. Br. Matt Landry has made an inquiry about starting a chapter in <u>Indiana</u>. He was sent materials¹ and invited to contact Provincial Companion Br. Bob Jarboe for more information on the history of the once active Indiana Chapter.
- 4. New Chapters As we prepare for the spring Council meeting in Pittsburgh, we have received a Covenanting Document for the re-organized Philippines Chapter. They plan on an annual meeting around St. Luke's Day, October 18, and quarterly regional meetings in three sub-chapter areas. The Holy Cross Chapter (Nebraska and Kansas East conferences) is requesting reinstatement and has submitted a new Covenanting Document. Their plans include an annual meeting and an annual retreat. The Council will take action on these requests.
- 5. **Reminder** The following process is used to track chapter transitions:
 - a. *Reorganizing* When one of the bi-annual chapter reports indicates a chapter is in trouble, list that chapter as "reorganizing" for one report cycle (October or May);
 - b. *Suspended* If there are no successful efforts to re-energize or regroup the chapter, list that group as being "suspended" for one year;
 - c. *Discontinue* Should the chapter remain inactive after one year, the Council will take a vote on the discontinuance of the chapter.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I have been appointed by Abbot Daniel to take up the ministry which was begun so ably by Br.Tom Beveridge. I am humbled by his confidence in me to do this work. I ask for your ongoing prayers that God will continue to be glorified by this work on behalf of the Order. As we have already learned from Br. Tom's work, the Pastor Care Officer is tasked with the particular ministry of interceding on behalf of those who are in need for particular prayer. These may be



celebratory or they may be sorrowful in nature. Whatever their source, they call us to remember that we are to be constant in prayer to God about our lives and ministries.

To seek to be as comprehensive in this prayer ministry as possible, I will be establishing a calendar to pray for the Church of Christ around the world, our General Officers, our Provincial Companions, our Priors, our Chapters, our Associations and our members on a particular rotating schedule. Additionally I will be lifting up prayer concerns via the Cyber chapter and "The Font" as I learn of them. In many instances, we will lift the name of the person who has requested prayer, without a particular reason being given, since our God whose Holy Spirit intercedes on our behalf is certainly aware of the particular situation. On other occasions, the particular concern or event necessitating prayer will be announced. We will continue to seek to be sensitive to the privacy of all involved and will not give a particular concern unless authorized by that person or unless that person has already publically asked for particular prayers. I will lift up prayers as requests or concerns are received. The following will be the particular pattern I will use as a revolving schedule for regular intercessions:

Mondays: The General Officers, the Appointed Officers, and our prior Abbots/Presidents of the Order;

Tuesdays: The Order –Chapters and Associations will be lifted up on a rotating basis by name. I would invite Priors to send me lists of their officers and members and of any particular concerns they may have.

Wednesdays: Provincial Companions and their areas of ministry so that we may remember our many members in diaspora;

Thursdays: Inquirers and New Comers to the Order;

Fridays: Priors and Chapter/Association Officers;

Saturday: The Order and the Community of Saint Luke;

Sunday: The Church Universal and for those in mission in the world.

We as an Order have been blessed by God to call others to the vital ministry of corporate prayer through worship and in personal devotions. Let us not grow weary in this work, for truly our Order, our denominations, the wide spectrum of Christian traditions, and our world are looking to us to be vigilant in approaching the throne of grace through our Savior Jesus Christ.
