Fostering connections within the Order of Saint Luke

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Sometimes life comes along fast and furious, even with delight. I am in the last days of a family reunion here on the North Shore of Oahu. Our children and grandchildren are hereô all of them. Our home office space is currently a bunkhouse for six boys (I made the small bunks!). In the midst of this, the first proof copy of the 4th edition of our *Book of Offices and Services* arrived last week and there appeared to be a copyright crisis that would delay publication. That is resolved now and I am awaiting the 2nd proof copy to arrive for a final review. I just listened to a video of our new bishop, Minerva Carcaño, who has been assigned to the California-Pacific Annual Conference, and I will have some role in planning worship when she visits the islands in the near future. The fall retreat is upon us with all of the preparations that go with it, including conferencing with



three who are finalizing discernment of life-vowed membership. At the Cathedral of Saint Andrew (Episcopal), where I work part-time, we will launch this years catechumenal ministry with a team formation day on September 8. As a member of a congregation I served said on a church workday, õIt was fun in an exhausting way!ö

õThose who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength,ö hymned Isaiah (40:31). Indeed!

I want to urge each of you to consider two things amidst your lifeøs journey just now. Please think of them as more than a promo from the abbot; think of them as calls to spiritual discipline.

One: prayerfully consider coming to the retreat in Pittsburgh this October. (See the details below.) If you have never been, I urge you, even plead with you, to find a way to attend. I am confident this could be a life-transforming event for you. Why? The retreat is a primary way to experience the communal life of the Order over several days that include daily prayer, daily Eucharist, common meals, and shared learning and reflection on our common life. The retreat calls us to realize the priority of the õconnectionö that binds us together under our Rule of Life and Service. Below Br. Jack Womack reminds us of moments when the sense of that "connectionö breaks into the routine of the daily grind. Br. Jackøs first national retreat was last year. It made a significant impact on his life, and that impact that so many of experience is the reason I urge you that have not attended before to come live with your sisters and brothers for a few days.

Two: When you receive your reaffirmation form sometime in the next few weeks (those of us who are annually vowed) please accompany your form with at least the suggested financial contribution to the work of the Order. If you are a life vowed member please attend to what God asks you give to the work of the Order when you receive the chancellor request for updated

contact information. While it is true that we do not require dues to be a member or to continue as a life-vowed member, it is also true that funds do not miraculously appear in the Orderøs bank account. The General Chapter, which includes all members present at the retreat, commits all of us to OSL ministries for the sake of the Order and the wider life of the church and world. Your support and mine make possible

- publications of pastoral and academic books
- periodicals for the Order, congregational leaders and the academy
- an urgently needed redesign and ongoing maintenance of our website,
- the Brother Hoyt Hickman awards given to seminary students outstanding in liturgy
- the spring Council meeting that brings many levels of OSL leadership to guide and lead the Orderøs work
- packets sent to new members, and much more

So, I ask you to contribute, not only the suggested amount, but to consider regular contributions throughout the year. Sr. Mary O and I give a monthly amount for the work of the Order beyond our reaffirmation contribution.

So, fast, furious and delightful is this life given us in our baptism and continued in all the places God puts us. May we together live the sacramental lifeô wet and grateful.

OSL Book of Offices and Services Now at the Printer!!

The book of resources based on the motifs found in the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles is now being printed and will be available at the fall retreat. *The Book of Offices and Services* (4th edition) is designed for both personal and community use. It includes a Lukan Service of Word and Table with four alternative Great Thanksgivings (by OSL members Daniel T. Benedict, Michael J. OøDonnell, Don E. Saliers, and Heather Murray Elkins), the Daily Office (for seven times of the day), pastoral services of prayer for healing and reconciliation, and a Transitus for the time of transition through death to Life.

Additional resources for each of these offices and services are also provided, including both traditional and contemporary sources, newly composed hymns, canticles using The Order of Saint Helena texts, and psalms as translated by the Priests for Equality. The ways in which these resources can express, nourish, and enrich our Lukan spirituality will be explored in our October retreat.

All those attending the retreat will receive a copy of the book as part of their registration. . Additional copies will be avaiable at the retreat for \$22.00. Sr. Heather and all on the email list,

What a joy to hear from you today. One of the things I treasure most about my connection as an elder in the UMC is othe connection.ö As a lifelong Methodist, I have experienced it in one way or another my whole life, through good times and down times, through numerous moves and changes in family. The sometimes disappointing thing about it, is that so many others take that same connection, so lightly. Upon joining the Order and participating while in seminary AND participating in a dispersed community with some folk I had met and some I had not, I felt a completeness and sense of connection that was different. Not that the people are better, or that any of us is smarter than anyone else, although some of you guys are really smart, but that those participating in the Order treasure it. It may be a very different experience for each of us, but it is valued and that makes it meaningful. So many times in life and in the church we accept and adapt to practices that have value to someone, but not for us. This time of discernment has helped me to look at my holy practices and attempt to discern the why or the purpose they serve in my attempt to live into the rule of life and service AND in my desire to be closer to God. So the reason your note was such a joy, is that I have been working with the local fire marshal now for the last 10 days or so. It seems that they neglected our building for annual inspections for the entirety of its existence. There have been ceilings to repair, exit signs to install, emergency lighting required and we have to eliminate extension cords totally. I am clear that the purpose behind this event is worthwhile, maybe even lifesaving at some point, but the joy of your note is that it grabbed me out of the check list of the world and whisked me into the midst of this faith community that we call the Order of St. Luke. Thank you for reaching out, it was a wonderful and refreshing reminder of our community.

Isnøt it interesting that õThe Monastic Wayö reading this morning ends by saying õTo the extent that we are, we are truly countercultural, for letting-be attacks the very roots of a culture hellbent on possession, productivity and domination.ö

Thanks for touching base. Today I will rediscover that fruitfulness is not necessarily the same as productivity.

Shortly after Labor Day, I will be contacting the various Chapters and Associations of the Order of Saint Luke to request reports on your recent activities. These bi-annual reports give us a sense of the health and strength of our Order in diaspora. The report is shared with the General Chapter when it meets in conjunction with our Retreat in October.

Each spring I ask about your group joys and challenges and each fall I request an accounting of your member gender and ethnicity. Membership lists are not necessary, just the appropriate numbers. This is in keeping with our status as an Affiliated Association of the General Board of Discipleship.

Normally, chapter reports are also shared with the Order via *The Font*. This has been done on a rotation basis with five or six chaptersø reports in each issue of our bi-monthly newsletter. Because of it has become necessary to update the listing of chapters, no individual chapter reports will be offered this time.

In place of the chapter reports, let me offer this numerical summary of the Order. We have 29 chartered OSL groups:
