Justen is my current image of faith in action.

Walking beside him up to the chancel, I was amazed at how he discerned his distance from the person in front of him by ever so gently touching the shoe heel. I doubt the man inhabiting those shoes even knew he had been tapped. Iød like to think that each of us, inhabited by the Holy Spirit, could live with such faith and discernment in this new year.

What are the central issues of your life as you enter 2014? What requires courage, discipline and white-cane spirituality? Health issues, aging, concern for children or parents, professional challenges, or growth in love?

As Lukans one thing is for sure: our Rule of Life and Service calls us to step into the day to day with some land marks in place (pillars, pews, steps and shoes!): the apostolic hope, the sacraments and the sacramental life, the call to service, and the corporate life and worship of the church.

Go in faith and be of good courage, brothers and sisters. Inability to see all that is before us invites our trust in God and in a moment-by-moment approach to life. We õsenseö our way forward attentive to every nuance of the landscape. If we bump into something or someone, it is part of the process of learning and living. Grace will abound.

Let us pray for and accompany one another, especially one or two others in the Order whom you know and stay in touch with on a regular basis. I am convinced the ordered life is a communal life. We are guides and companions to each other.

From Br. Roger Baker

Greetings sisters and brothers! Our Abbot has asked me to briefly share my story.

Iøve been a member of OSL for almost 13 years. I became our webmaster briefly when my skill set was needed some four years ago. Then in 2012 came brain cancer, an addition to the multiple sclerosis that had already taken me out of the pulpit. In the last two years, brain cancer and the ensuing three surgeries have changed my life. My surgeon predicted a twelve to eighteen month survival. Another specialist predicted as much as two years. The start of my good news? I will celebrate crossing both õfinish linesö this March

16th. By Godøs grace, *I have survived*.

But this is not just a tale of survival. What I first envisioned as possible has been turned into a flood of blessings from friends, family, and from Christ. I have begun to understand the necessity of a degree of suffering for most of us to be able to understand the many gifts of our Savior. In the midst of what I formerly viewed as suffering, I have found happiness, joy, and revelation. True, my speech is often slow and limited, sufficiently that I rarely use the telephone. But when I do speak, I can always give thanks and celebrate, sometimes with stuttering, sometimes without. My hearing finds many odd tones and unexpected silences, but my listening has become far gentler and much deeper, creating understanding in my heart. My sight is poor at night and often unable to read fine print, but my eyes see the Lordøs creative love everywhere. I feel pain and fatigue, yet my heart feels a love springing into actions I couldnøt even imagine before. I taste everything with new insight, new familiarity, and deeper forgiveness. God has countered illness with insight. I cannot imagine being held as õdisabledö when my heart feels love in so many new ways.

I am missing a portion of brain that once controlled things important to me in my past: any memory of names, the ability to walk distances or even run, and the memories of academic degrees and job experiences. I might sorrow over my losses, but I have gained so much more. I pray far more deeply, and so far almost constantly, in everything I say and do. I find myself deeply loving those for whom I felt no affection before, except through an understanding of a duty to love everyone. I finally understand the great simplicity of õlove thy neighbor.ö By the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, I can love all, and now I simply do! For me, this is miraculous.

My miracles continued. As I prepared for more chemotherapy and treatment, my doctors gave me the news that my chemotherapy had achieved a rarity for õterminalö brain cancer: it has stopped. There is no more brain cancer. The disease predicted to progressively terminate my life has simply vanished. My chemotherapy has stopped for the last few months with no new symptoms. No new cancer. I still have the results of brain surgery, including scars and memory loss. I still have to use crutches associated with multiple sclerosis. I still take a rather large selection of pharmaceuticals associated with both illnesses. This is care for the physical. In my spiritual journey, I have grown and found new depths of understanding and love. In the midst of a health meltdown, I have received blessings and insight I couldn¢t have imagined otherwise. While I have lost abilities for simple understandings such as names, quotations, and verse, and lost the ability to wander physically, or to labor, or to preach, I am still my master¢s servant being taught with Divine love, and gifted with new understandings. My pain and disability have transformed into a new perspective, a happy revelation, and a full set of unimaginable blessings. I have been deeply blessed.

If youøve prayed for me, please know that your prayers have been answered. And I, your brother in Christ Jesus, am praying for you, too.

Provincial General's Article – January / February 2014

For several years I have been reporting the news of each chapter or association with the Order. Periodically I adjust the list to reflect the current status of our chartered groups and a new reporting pattern emerges as it does with this issue of The Font. Each of these reports is



derived from reports prepared for either the General Chapter meeting (in October) or the Council meeting (held in May). The primary purpose of sharing this information is so that all OSL brothers and sisters can be inspired by or learn from what other groups are doing.

Some chapters have changed their status this past year. We have two groups who have changed their from being a chapter to become an association. The New York Conference Chapter is now the New York Conference Association; the Northern Illinois Chapter is now the Northern Illinois Association. If there is future growth in these groups they may request another change of status. One group, the Southwest Iowa Association, was discontinued at their request in May 2013. Two chapters were suspended in October 2013 ó the Oklahoma Chapter and the St. Stephen Chapter. After being suspended for two years, and with no report of activity since June 2010, the Puerto Rico Chapter was discontinued.

Now, here is the news from the local chapters and associations:

The Albemarle Association meets biweekly for Morning Prayer followed by a pastorsø Lectionary Bible Study and occasional book study. Those who are able go to lunch afterwards. We have two members and three guests (on average). The prior is Br. Kevin Taylor; the chaplain is Rev. Jim Bernacki.

Br. Rich Zimmerman, Chancellor of the Holy Cross Chapter, reported on Mya 13, 2013: Prior Kenton Van contacted several members of the chapter, prior to the clergy gathering for the Great Plains Episcopal area in January, to arrange some time together as siblings of the Order. Three existing conferences in the Great Plains area will hold their final annual conferences in a few weeks. Then in August, most of the delegation from the three existing conferences will gather is Salina, Kansas for a uniting conference which will take the name of the area and become effective January 1, 2014.

In April 2013, Br. Irving Cotto reported for the New Jersey-Pennsylvania Latino Chapter: We are regrouping our chapter on May 13 at Wesley UMC in Trenton, NJ after many months without meeting and not know with certainty what would be the future of the chapter. However, there is enough interest and commitment to continue this chapter. Although the chapter is not exclusive of any person its primer focus has been to reach out to the Latino individuals interested in the Sacramental Life. The content of our meetings have revolved around discussions pertaining to the practice of Sacraments according to UM documents and sharing of each memberøs liturgical production. The officers are: Prior: Br. Irving Cotto, Chancellor: Br. Manuel Sardiñas, Chaplain: Br. Joel A. Fernandez.

The latest news from St. Francis Chapter in the West Ohio Annual Conference was in May 2013, at which time Sr. Barbara Lee reported: The chapter is still active with 15 members scattered all over the conference. Some are more active than others. We have the potential for six new members in various stages of interest. Some of us meet regularly by phone and with Br. Tom Beverage for Morning Prayer on Thursdays. Our Prior is Br. G. Alan Brown and our Chancellor is Sr. Barb Lee.

The West Virginia Chapter meets at least three times a year but our activity level has been low. At last count I believe we have nine active and 5-10 inactive members. Our officers are: Br. Jeffrey Kanode, Prior; Br. Tim Bleigh, Sub-Prior; Br. Jim Reed, Chancellor.
