Daniel Benedict, we are initiating "cohort groups" for people who are discerning whether taking vows in The Order of Saint Luke is for them.

Each group will consist of 5 or 6 "discerners" along with the persons who are companioning each of them through the discernment process. They will meet via Zoom for five sessions (probably every other week), led by experienced members of the Order – often current or former leaders within the Order – who can offer insight into who we are and what we do. One great advantage of this approach is that it focuses on building relationships rather than just imparting information. We want to foster conversations more than just academic learning. We believe that this will benefit those in the discernment process, and it will also benefit those who serve as Companions. Rather than focusing on a teaching role (information transfer), companions will be able to concentrate on helping potential new members decide if The Order of Saint Luke is a good fit with their interests, their spirituality, and their life.

I want to thank Sr. Barb, Br. Daniel, and Sr. Beth for the work they have done to develop this program. I think it is an important contribution to our membership process. I would encourage people to volunteer to be Companions. I think that these changes will make that responsibility both easier and, I hope, more fun. If you are asked to take on this role, please say yes.

As we move into 2021, please continue to hold one another in prayer. There will be more stressful days before we leave this pandemic behind. Find beauty where you can. Spread love where you can. Praise God through it all.

Sr. Inga Freyer-Nicholas (1948 -2010)

The Reverend Inga Freyer-Nicholas, OSL, wife of The Reverend Ronal Freyer-Nicholas, OSL, Pastor of Pilgrims' United Church of Christ, Fruitland Park, Fla., died peacefully Tuesday, April 20, 2010, at Cornerstone Hospice in Lady Lake, Fla.

Sr. Inga was born 19 October 1948 in New York City to Martin and April (Temple) Freyer but grew up in California, graduating from San Rafael High School in 1966. She earned an AA with honors in early childhood development from the College of Marin in 1968 and completed her BA with high honors in psychology at Rhode Island College in 1974. In 1988 she completed her Masters of Divinity degree at Andover Newton Theological School, Newton, Massachusetts. Sr. Freyer-Nicholas was ordained at First Baptist Church. Norwood, Massachusetts, for the American Baptist Churches, 29 May 1988, and served with her husband as pastor of churches in Massachusetts, Iowa, California, and Michigan until disability forced early retirement in 2004. Also, she served as pastor to the Chinese Community Church in Milwaukee while her husband served a nearby church. In 1992, Sr. Inga Freyer-Nicholas professed her vows in the Order of Saint Luke.

With her first husband, Michael Zifcak, of Providence, Rhode Island, she had two daughters, Lisa Zifcak Dunn



(Alvin and Christina Zifcak. With her second husband, Ron, she raised her s t e p s o n, A n d r e w N i c h o l a s (Kristina). Sr. Inga was sur-

vived by her husband and children, six grandchildren, a brother, Tom Freyer of San Francisco, nieces, nephews, and other family, including her cousin-whowas-like-a sister, Jean Silverman, of Newmarket, NH, plus many friends from coast-to-coast.

Before becoming a minister, Sr. Inga had been a geriatric nurse, a career counselor, an owner-operator of a day care center, and supervisor of college students studying for degrees in early childhood development. Since ordination she served in several associations and regions of the American Baptist Churches (ABC) as member or chair of commissions on ministerial standing and served a term as member of the midwest section of the ABC national commission on ministerial standing. In Wisconsin, she served as President of the Wisconsin ABC Ministers Council and was a volunteer assistant professor of Pastoral Care at Milwaukee Theological Institute. She wrote many articles for various publications and was a Contributing Editor for Robert Webber's Complete Library of Christian Worship, in eight volumes, published in 1992.

In addition to her regular duties as pastor, Sr. Inga Freyer-Nicholas also established the Protestant Chaplaincy Office at Norwood Hospital, Norwood, MA, and served there as chaplain, later serving as a duty chaplain at Covenant Health Care in Saginaw, Michigan. She was a family systems counselor as well. Sr. Inga was a member of First Baptist Church, Midland, Michigan, and Pilgrims' United Church of Christ, Fruitland Park, Florida. During her years in ministry, she served as a role model and mentor for other women in ministry.

On April 24, 2010, there was a visitation at Pilgrims' United Church of Christ and a funeral service with communion, followed by cremation with a private committal. Memorial gifts were made to the Pilgrims' United Church Memorial Fund, Fruitland Park, Florida.

Requiescat in pace, Sister Inga Freyer-Nicholas, OSL, as we remember you this day.

COMPANION FOR LIFE-VOWED MEMBERS Contemplating the Rule of Life and Service

The Rule of Life and Service of The Order of Saint Luke is a primary means of spiritual formation by which all members covenant to live. The journey to Life Vows includes deep contemplation of the Rule and the role it plays in sacramental living.

We affirm the apostolic hope:

With the apostles and the Church through the ages, we affirm Jesus Christ, Sacrament of the presence of God, as the source of our hope. We take our name from St. Luke the Evangelist, and seek to be incorporated into the paschal mystery he proclaims. We pray that we may be formed by the Incarnation, life, death, resurrection, ascension, gift of the Holy Spirit, and coming again of Jesus Christ. We are sent forth to proclaim and to live the hope that good news brings.

The first vow in our Rule of Life and Service packs the whole of Christian faith into a few sentences! When we began to dive deeper into this one paragraph, we find ourselves contemplating some of the deepest mysteries of what it means to be a Christian.

In my own year of discernment toward Life Vows, I found myself asking: What does it mean to be "formed" spiritually by the "Incarnation, life, death, Resurrection, ascension, gift of the Holy Spirit and coming again of Jesus Christ"? Each of these citations is a distinct event, and yet they are inextricably intertwined with one another.

For example, think for a moment about the Incarnation. Scripture teaches that it begins not with Jesus' birth, nor even with Mary's assent to bear the Christ. Paul teaches that a key moment in the Incarnation begins with Christ's willing "kenosis," or emptying, that fa-

willing "kenosis," or emptying, that facilitates taking on flesh to experience the fullness of life as one of God's creations, a human being.

Then there's the moment of Jesus' conception, as the Archangel Gabriel tells Mary in Luke 1:35a: "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you..." (NRSV). Often, we overlook that important comma between two clauses, which typically indicates two separate actions. Theologian Jurgen Moltmann asserts that this passage can be read as a circumstance in which the wombs of the feminine Spirit and the human woman "conjoined," enabling Jesus' conception as a being both divine and human. We don't know how to explain this in human terms; we can only attest to its reality in poetic metaphor. The accounts of Jesus' wisdom and compassion, his ministries of healing and teaching, demonstrate that he was a being simultaneously human and godly.

We aren't Jesus, but scripture and tradition both hold that our task as disciples is to aspire to the ideals that Jesus exemplified. We know that as humans we will fall short of Jesus' nature, and yet we continue to strive toward the goal of love expressed through service.

The most poignant aspect of our first vow for me, especially over this past year of coronavirus pandemic, comes in contemplation of Jesus' death. During Lent we begin to imagine the pain Jesus endured out of love for humanity. The mind boggles at the prospect that a being possessed of divine nature, present since the beginning of time, willingly accepted human death, and death through one of the most agonizing methods possible. This vision of love confronts us at every turn when we encounter our own deaths, what the Jesuits sometimes term our "existential poverty." We will die, not in the same manner that Jesus died, but our lives will end. Jesus' example gives us the courage to face dying and death, perhaps the most mysterious experience of human existence.
