I love to anticipate events! For me, looking forward to something is half of the enjoyment. In preparing for an upcoming event, I learn and grow and ready myself to benefit from what is to come.

This year, we want to offer an anticipatory book study as we look forward to our October retreat with guest speaker Dr. Karl Kuhn. While Dr. Kuhn intends to speak about the significance of wilderness in Luke's gospel and what that might mean for us as Lukans, in 2015 he published a book entitled *The Kingdom According to Luke and Acts: a Social, Literary, and Theological Introduction.* Spending some time with this book before retreat will introduce us to Dr. Kuhn's work, ground us in Luke's writing, and afford us the opportunity to prepare for our time at retreat together!

We will hold a three-week series of Zoom sessions, on September 25, October 2, and October 9 beginning at 7:30 EST each evening. All members of the Order are invited to participate: whether or not you are able to come to retreat, whether or not you have read the book yet, and whether or not you consider yourself a Biblical scholar. We trust that the conversation will be beneficial to all.

The three sessions of this study will be led by Br. Scot Bontrager, Sr. Heather Josselyn-Cranson, and Br. Christopher Montgomery. Each one will last no more than 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours, and the Zoom link will remain the same for each of the three meetings:

The 1984 Convocation: A Recollection

In 1984 I was in my sixth year of membership in the Order of Saint Luke. I was a newbie and my antennae were up! Attending the 1984 Convocation in Jeanette Pennsylvania was my introduction to the Order at the General Chapter level. What follows is a brief recollection of the convocation based on notes in my journal. I hope it offers some perspective, especially for more recent members.

Flying from California on October 8, I arrived in Newark NJ on Peoples Express and connected to Pittsburg. Sr. Emily Byrd met Sr. Sarah Flynn and me and hosted us at her home in Nobletown.

The convocation began with Eucharist using service music composed by Carlton "Sam" Young and Bishop James Ault, OSL (photo right) presiding. In the afternoon, Bishop Ault gave an address: "The Sacraments in the General Ministry".

The Executive Committee included Br. Milt Peden (Mississippi), David Bort (Vermont), Michael J. O'Donnell (East Ohio), Ken Smith (NNJ), Logan Swanger (Central PA), Jim Morgan (Western Michigan). There were eleven chapters (including two new chapters—Central PA and West Michigan). There were 305 members; 21 members were removed. I am not sure of the criteria for the action.





In the evening, "Sam" Young (photo left), editor of forthcoming United Methodist Hymnal gave an address titled "Imperatives in Christian Worship".

On October 10, after morning prayer, Kendall McCabe gave an address: "Today's Spirituality and the Sacraments in United Methodism Today". Near the end of his talk, McCabe urged us not to go back to Wesley ("because he made his mistakes"), but "to go forward". He went on to say what is timely in our day: "We don't say the daily office when we feel like it—but [say it] daily because it is there to say. Trust the faithfulness of God and life in the Spirit

among broken bodies and the shed blood of this world." Earlier in the address he had told us of Filipino activists who were grounded in the prayers of the liturgy and so their lives had become liturgical when life must be yielded, and blood spilled; they lived in sacrifice. I'll add here that this reminds me of the OSL prayer in the MP and EP on WADO that includes these lines:

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grant that, by your Spirit, we may accept the call to service to become one with the broken bread of your Church, one with the new wine of your kin-dom, and one with the oil of healing and gladness for the wounded and oppressed of this world.

In the afternoon, Br. Hoyt Hickman (photo right) addressed us on the current four priorities of the Section on Worship of the General Board of Discipleship:

- 1. follow through work on the ritual
- 2. work with the hymnal revision committee
- 3. the preaching project (a project that included David Buttrick working with selected pastors)
- 4. inclusiveness and wholeness in worship.

In his talk he focused on the forthcoming *The Book of Services* (1985), which distilled and gathered up the work of the Supplemental Worship Resource Series (SWR) that started in 1972.

In the evening, Br. Michael J. O'Donnell (photo right) talked to the community on the topic, "The Order of Saint Luke: A Physical and Spiritual Community". He mused about how to increase the sense of community:

- 1. Gather in physical community: "we have a covenant to be together in the community"
- 2. Publish a newsletter to connect us (The Font came into being)
- 3. Pray with partners, urging us to pair up with one other member
- 4. Develop new chapters
- 5. Embody a "monastic sense" of life together. In my recollection this was powerful and significant in the hearing of those at the convocation. Br. Michael challenged us to hold a new vision of the Order that struck fire with some and put off others. I think this became a central issue of conversation in the 1984 Convocation and one that shifted the direction and character of the Order under Br. Michael's leadership. I included in my journal the words, "Abbot or Abbess" and I think he must have pitched that language into the discussion. Note: for a more complete picture and thoroughly researched consideration of the evolution of our move from a society to a religious community see Br. Mark Stamm's article, "Presidents, Abbots, and Other General Officers ..." piece in <u>Doxology 35:3</u>.



August 27, 2025 Page 6 of 12 On October 11, the concluding day of the convocation, James F. White did a "walk-through commentary"—item by item—of the evolving Word and Table service that would be in *The Book of Services*.

The 1984 Convocation was significant as many churches (Episcopal, Lutheran, Roman, Reformed, and United Methodist) were revising their ritual resources considering Vatican II and the so called "ecumenical consensus". And it marked a substantial evolution in how we understood ourselves as a community of religious embracing liturgical renewal.

I feel privileged to have been there and share this in hope that it fills in some of the Order's story. I hope that others who were there will share their memories of the convocation.

Br. Daniel is a life-vowed member and served as abbot of the Order from 2009-2016.

Just a few thoughts from your historian.

- 1. I have recordings of several interview that I've conducted with members of the Order, past and present. I need volunteers for transcribing them. Note that the transcription doesn't have to be perfect, and for a variety of reasons achieving a perfect transcription can be difficult. Thus, your best effort is all I ask, and I'm willing to coach you and there are other experienced transcribers who can guide you. If you're willing, please let me know and you can try your hand at the process. I won't give you more than one at a time, so fret not about overload.
- 2. Consider writing and submitting a short account of your life and your ministry, as it was expressed both within the Order and in your wider circles. Living the sacramental life has unfolded in many and varied ways among us—both within and beyond the Order--and it is good to have some record of these stories, expressed in your own words. Dr. Kuhn is the Grace Chair of Religious Studies at Lakeland University in Madison, WI. He has written two books on Luke: *Luke: The Elite Evangelist* (Liturgical Press, 2010) and *The Kingdom According to Luke and Acts: A Social, Literary, and Theological Introduction* (Baker, 2015).





We will gather at Mercy Conference and Retreat Center in St. Louis, MO. Mercy offers us comfortable places for worship and gathering indoors, as well as Stations of the Cross, a Grotto, an 11-circuit labyrinth, and a walking path, all outdoors.
